"On the night of his arrest, Christ took bread and broke it saying take and eat all of you and do so in remembrance of me"....These are part of the

words of institution we use when observing Communion in our Christian tradition. We say them to remind us how Jesus took the bread and wine customarily used by Jews during the Passover meal and gave them meaning for our Christian belief in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. As Holy Week approaches, these words warrant further examination for Christians.

Those first words "On the night of his arrest" carry with them the reality that one of Jesus' close friends and disciples handed Jesus over to be arrested, given a mock trial, beaten, and crucified.

Thankfully death was and is not the final word; resurrection was and is the final word in creation. The power of God's love is stronger even than death. This truth is at the heart of our Christian faith.

The betrayal that resulted in Jesus' arrest has often caused me to wonder about Judas. If it was God's will that Jesus die, then wasn't Judas doing God's will? If so, then was he a greater sinner than anyone else by virtue of his sin being integral in Jesus' going to be crucified? God used this betrayal as part of the plan to offer salvation to the world. It could be God just doing what God does, redeeming the worst of us to bring about hope even in the darkest of hours. Was it a case of God bringing from a sinful action the redemption of humankind? Yes at least in part.

Are we even allowed as Christians to ask such questions? Yes. God can handle it. Remember? God is the Creator of the Universe, Omnipotent, Omnipresent, etc. "Gee I wonder if the Eternal Infinite Being of all time and space could handle being asked questions that arise from the brains we were given by the same Being." Ummmm....yeah.

It took me until I was 20 years old and attending a Presbyterian campus ministry group to have that thought affirmed. Thank you to Rev. Bob Bondurant, and PROWL (People Reaching Out With Love) at Marshall University. I had been told asking such questions revealed a lack of faith on my part. I learned from Presbyterians that it is actually an indicator of faith. Having affirmed that it was part of discipleship to examine one's own faith helped me respond to a call into parish ministry. After all if we DON'T think God can handle our questions, or we think we're NOT to ask such things then what does that say about our image of God? It would mean that God was an overly sensitive being essentially along the lines of an abusive parent. Imagine a father who says to a child, "Don't you question me and my judgment!" intimidating the child into fearful obedience. I don't believe God's nature resembles this in the least.

I find it hard to believe, no scratch that, IMPOSSI-BLE to believe that God who Scripture tells us is slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love would even BLINK at you and I asking faith questions, and working to understand God's nature.

Such questioning deepens our faith because it invites us to THINK about why we believe what we believe, and exactly WHAT we believe. Then we can not only trust and believe in Jesus Christ, we can do so knowing that we've grown and matured along the path of discipleship.

It comes back then to trust. Jesus had to trust Judas without regard for whether he would be betrayed. When we trust in someone, we calculate the risk of being able to handle the consequences should that person decide to betray our trust. Jesus obviously was able to handle it, you know being God and all.

What about us? Do we have people in our lives in whom we trust without regard for whether they will betray us? That's love. We can trust in Jesus Christ and know that he will always remain faithful to each of us and to all of humanity. ALWAYS God will love us. God is ALWAYS faithful to love and forgive us. That's the good news.

Descartes said Cogito Ergo Sum-"I think, therefore I am." I like to say "I think, therefore I believe." What do you think? What do you believe?

**April 8<sup>th</sup>:** Easter Sunday, no forum.



### HEALTH NEWS from the Parish Nurse . . Nancy Jean Graves APRIL 2012 MOWER SAFETY



With spring comes haste to once more have a neatly mowed yard. Out comes the lawn mower which is one of the most dangerous tools around the home. Each year approximately 68,000 persons with lawn mower injuries are treated in emergency rooms. More than 9,000 of those treated are younger than 18 years old. Older children and adolescents are more often hurt while cutting lawns as chores or a way to earn money.

Lawn mower injuries include deep cuts, loss of fingers and toes, broken and dislocated bones, burns, eye and other injuries. Some are very serious. Both users of mowers and those who are nearby can be hurt.

To prevent lawn mower injuries to children, the American Academy of Pediatrics recommends:

- Use a mower with a control that stops the mower from moving forward if the handle is let go.
- Children younger than 16 years should not be allowed to use ride-on mowers.
- Children younger than 12 years should not use walk behind mowers.
- Always wear sturdy shoes (not sandles or sneakers) while mowing.
- Prevent injuries from flying objects (stones, toys, etc.) by picking up objects from lawn before mowing. Use a collection bag for grass clippings or a plate that covers the opening where cut grass is released.
- Anyone using a mower should wear hearing and eye protection.
- Make sure children are indoors or at a safe distance away from the area you plan to mow.
- Start and refuel mowers outdoors. Refuel mowers with the motor turned off and cool.
- Make sure the blade settings are done by an adult with the mower off and spark plug removed.
- Do not pull the mower backward or mow in reverse unless absolutely necessary, and carefully look for children behind you when you mow in reverse.
- Always turn off the mower and wait for blades to stop completely before removing the grass catcher, unclogging the discharge chute, or crossing a gravel path, roads, or other areas.
- DO NOT ALLOW CHILDREN TO RIDE AS PASSENGERS ON RIDE-ON MOWERS.

#### WHAT IS THE ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING OFFERING?

Immediately following WWII, Protestant churches in the U.S. made appeals for the relief and reconstruction of areas devastated by the war, primarily Europe and Asia. In 1949, the leaders of several denominations formed a committee to organize an appeal to support their churches' separate campaigns.

A program called One Great Hour was broadcast on March 26, 1949, over major networks and many independent stations. The broadcast closed with a request that listeners attend their local church the following morning and make a sacrificial contribution. No exact measure of receipts was possible, but it was estimated that more than 75,000 churches participated.

The next year, the offering was repeated, using the name "One Great Hour of Sharing" for the first time. At times, One Great Hour of Sharing was coordinated with both the Roman Catholic Bishops' Fund Appeal for Overseas Aid and the Jewish Passover Appeal. Free time and space were donated to this joint appeal through the Advertising Council.

From the beginning, this has been an ecumenical effort. As denominations changed and merged, One Great Hour of Sharing has varied from eight to 29 participating communions. While each denomination allocates its gifts differently, all use their funds for ministries of disaster relief, refugee assistance and development aid. Today, projects supported by One Great Hour of Sharing are under way in more than 100 countries, including the United States and Canada. In recent years Presbyterians have given about \$10 million annually.

Offering envelopes for the One Great Hour of Sharing will be available in the weekly bulletins up to Easter Sunday, April 8th when the offering is typically received.
